Coast presenter Nicholas Crane, whom you suspect was born with a rucksack on his back, hikes in the footsteps of early travel writers who helped to open up large parts of our countryside and culture. He begins with naturalist Thomas Pennant's 1772 tour of Scotland. Foolsore and soaked, Crane gives a vivid sense of a British Isles that was remote, inaccessible and impoverished until the turn of the 19th century.

Three of the pupils sexually abused by teachers at a Buckinghamshire prep school between 1964 and 1970 reflect candidly on events they have kept quiet about for decades. Some were afraid that attacking their old school would be seen as a criticism of the parents who sent them there. One teacher eventually admitted to abuse in 2003 but only served a year in jail. The case against the school's former headmaster was thrown out of court. Is there, the victims wonder, an Establishment reluctance to acknowledge abuse in boarding schools?
